Interestingly, scientists still do not really understand love. But they do know that love starts in the brain (脳 髄), and that there are a few important molecules (分 子) and chemicals (化合物) involved.

The first is oxytocin $(\not = \dot > \dot > \dot >)$. This chemical is released when a mother gives birth to a baby. It helps her to bond with her new child and makes sure that she takes care of it, since babies are a lot of work! Oxytocin is also released in people who are in long-term relationships, like my parents, who have been married for 31 years.

The second is dopamine $(F - \mathcal{S} \neq \mathcal{V})$, which is released when you first start to like someone. Dopamine can make you feel excited and happy. It also causes the release of adrenaline $(\mathcal{F} F \mathcal{V} \neq \mathcal{Y} \mathcal{V})$, which can make you so excited that you cannot eat or sleep!

Spending time with people that you love, like your friends, coworkers, and family members, also increases dopamine in your brain. This is why we feel happy when we are with the people that we love.

Every time I talk on the phone with my mom, my sister, or my best friends, I tell them that I love them. It's usually how we end the conversation!
